Thank you for reading the 2020-21 edition of Pacific Charter Institute's Annual Report. Pacific Charter Institute and its family of schools stayed on mission during a year in which most other schools struggled or closed. PCI achieved another successful year by putting students first.

As the California legislature opted not to fund independent study

charter school growth, PCI took its fiscal responsibility and commitment to its current students seriously and kept enrollment numbers steady at approximately 3,100 students. A deeper look into the demographics of these PCI families found that 26 languages were spoken across the four schools. After English, Spanish was the second highest represented language in Rio Valley Charter School. Arabic was the highest non-English speaking language subgroup for Valley View Charter Prep. The Slavic languages, Russian and Ukrainian, trended highest for both Heritage Peak Charter School and Sutter Peak Charter Academy. PCI students are indeed diverse.

PCI's strategic goals impressively charged ahead, with notable growth in the oral reading skills of its youngest students. Additionally, PCI saw an approximate 300% jump in mid-year graduates in 20-21 than in past years. Services in wellness and outreach pivoted and grew. More live, online student contacts were made through virtual classes, counseling events, and supervised field excursions.

It is an honor to share with you Pacific Charter Institute's latest year of achievements. My sincere gratitude goes out to the departments and schools for their statistical contributions. The data, along with the faces of PCI, together tell a fabulous story of student and organizational success.

Message from the Executive Director

Paul Keefer, MBA, Ed.D.



Thank you for walking this journey with Pacific Charter Institute as our team successfully adapted to the academic and societal changes. The PCI team remained focused and student oriented throughout the 2020-21 school year. We maintained our academic expectations with the appropriate safeguards to ensure that we successfully served our students while also adhering to the COVID-19 protocols. This report outlines what we accomplished in a very difficult year.

PCI staff remained laser focused on academic achievement including early literacy, closing achievement gaps, A-G course completion, career certificates, community college completion, and virtual classes.

- Our K-2 early literacy achievement improved in phonemic awareness, decoding, and oral reading fluency year on year in most areas compared to 2019-2020.
- Our students using Exact Path intervention increased their passage rate year on year, and the Exact Path diagnostic indicated substantial gains for our students.
- Our momentum for enrolling students in A-G courses increased through grade 11.
- Our student enrollment decreased for the iCEV online career programs yet our students performed much better completing more classes and earning far more certificates.
- Our community college enrollment also decreased compared to last year in our preliminary numbers except for Rio Valley, which grew due to partnerships with Delta College.
- PCI successfully offered over 40 virtual classes for our students serving over 800 students across the counties that we serve.

California did not mandate the CAASPP assessment, and along with most schools and school districts, we did not offer it. We did complete pre, mid, and post assessments for these same grade levels using Exact Path Diagnostic, which provided a solid indicator of student success at PCI.

Our support departments successfully served our families and staff from remote workspaces with the protocols established in the prior year.

- PCI maintained a balanced budget even though the legislature froze funding at 2019-20 levels for our schools.
- Our Human Resources team refined new staff member onboarding protocols and successfully implemented mandated as well as PCI initiative trainings.
- Our annual staff survey revealed academic priorities and support remained relatively consistent.
- The PCI Information Technology team successfully supported staff and students with an intricate support system that included Microsoft Teams office hours as well as phone and in person support.

Although the pandemic disrupted our ability to meet with our families and students in-person we were able to leverage our innovation to increase student achievement while keeping positive relationships with our families. Thank you for your support and trust in the PCI Team to reach our academic and organizational goals.

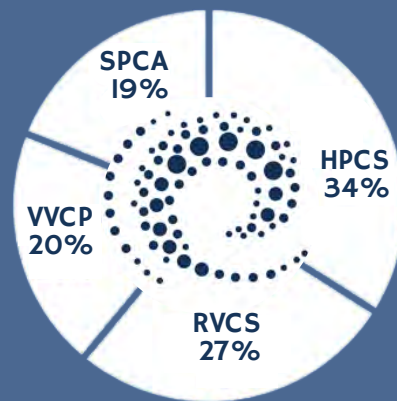

Wellness Program

As the wellness of all our students is a priority, Pacific Charter Institute's Wellness Team assists students and families in navigating supports within PCI, accessing resources in the community, and offering a safe place to strategize the improvement of health and wellbeing of the family. This multi-tiered level of support includes school counselors, medical personnel, and the Wellness Referral link that initiates help into action confidentially.

Staff members contributed to a new Emergency Relief Fund to help our students, families, and staff members in times of need including those affected by natural disasters including the LNU Lightning Complex Fire and pandemic-related needs. Our Families in Transition program continues to serve homeless students and their families.

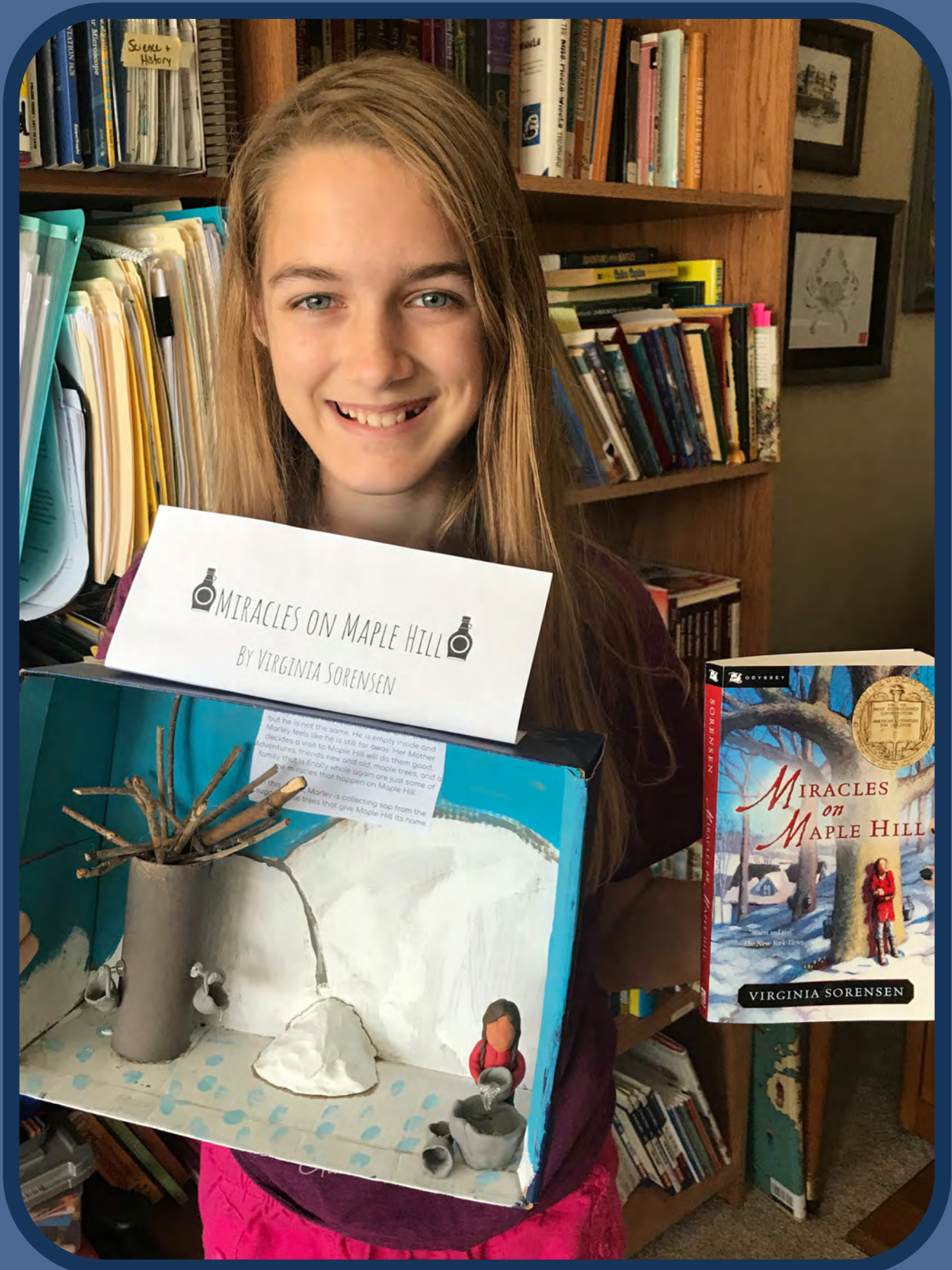

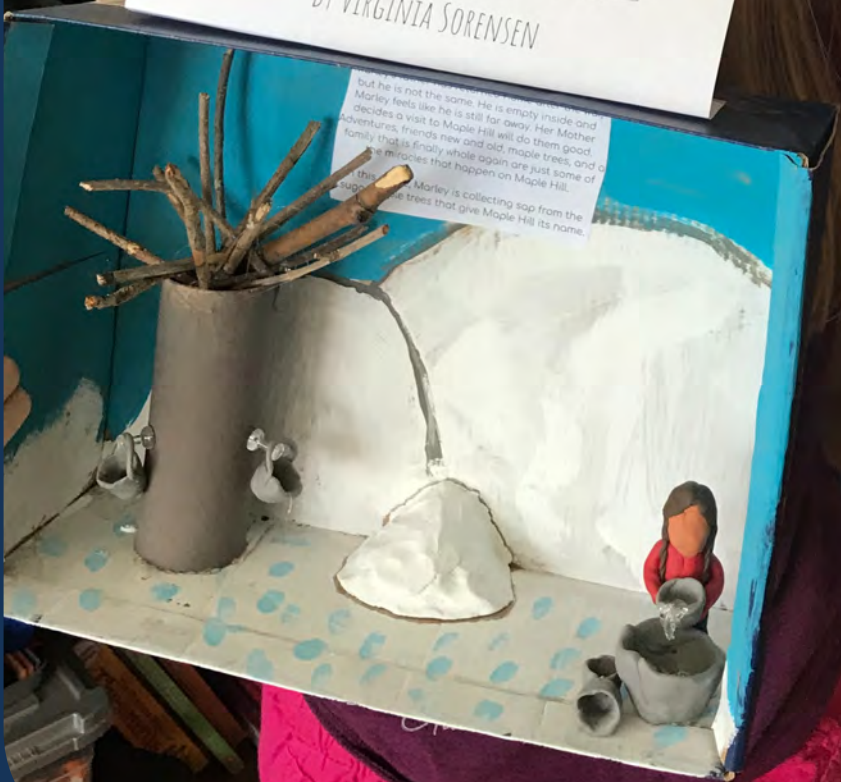
Mobile & Responsive

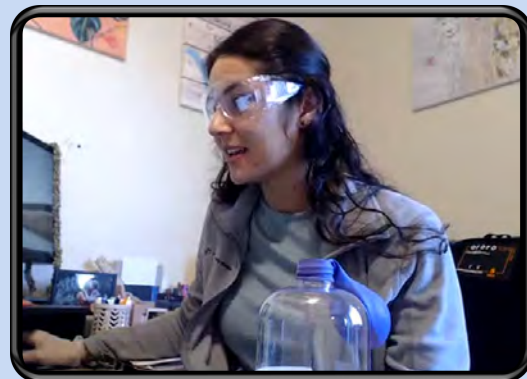

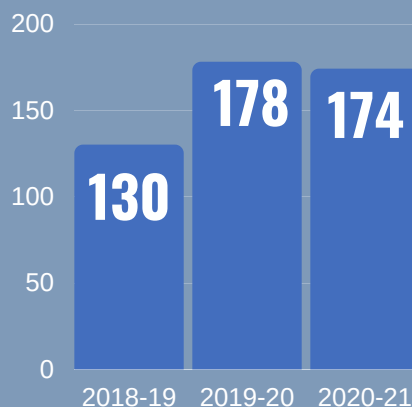
Alexis was also the recipient of three PCI scholarships at graduation.

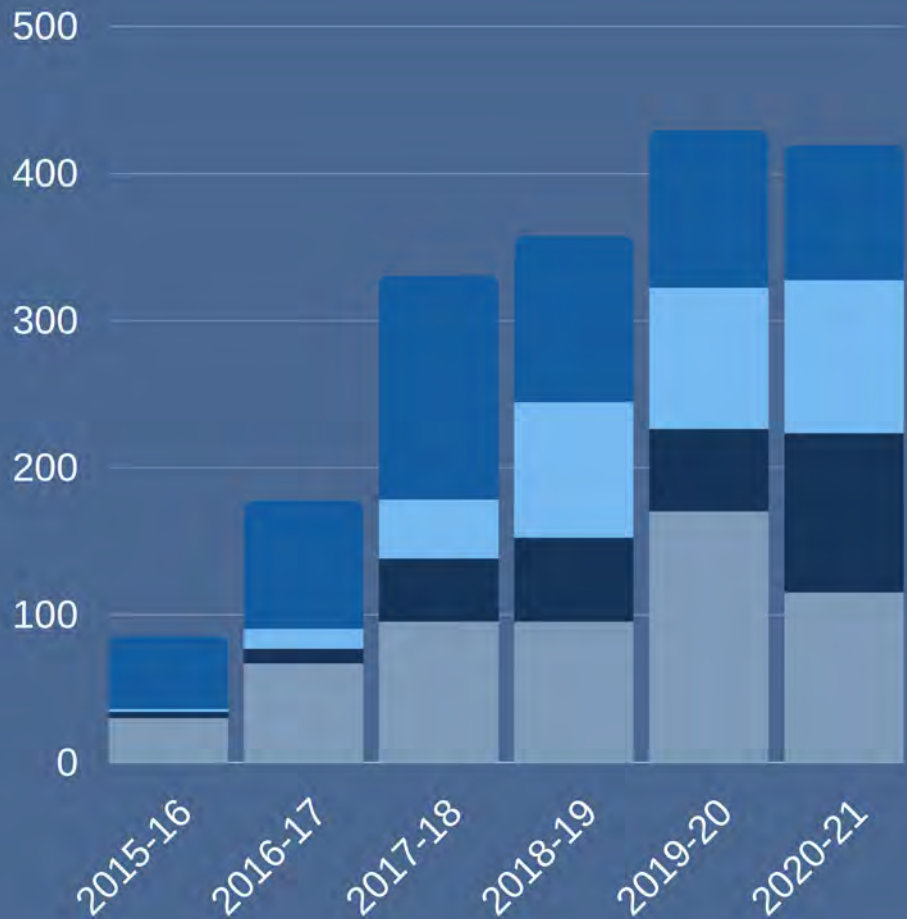

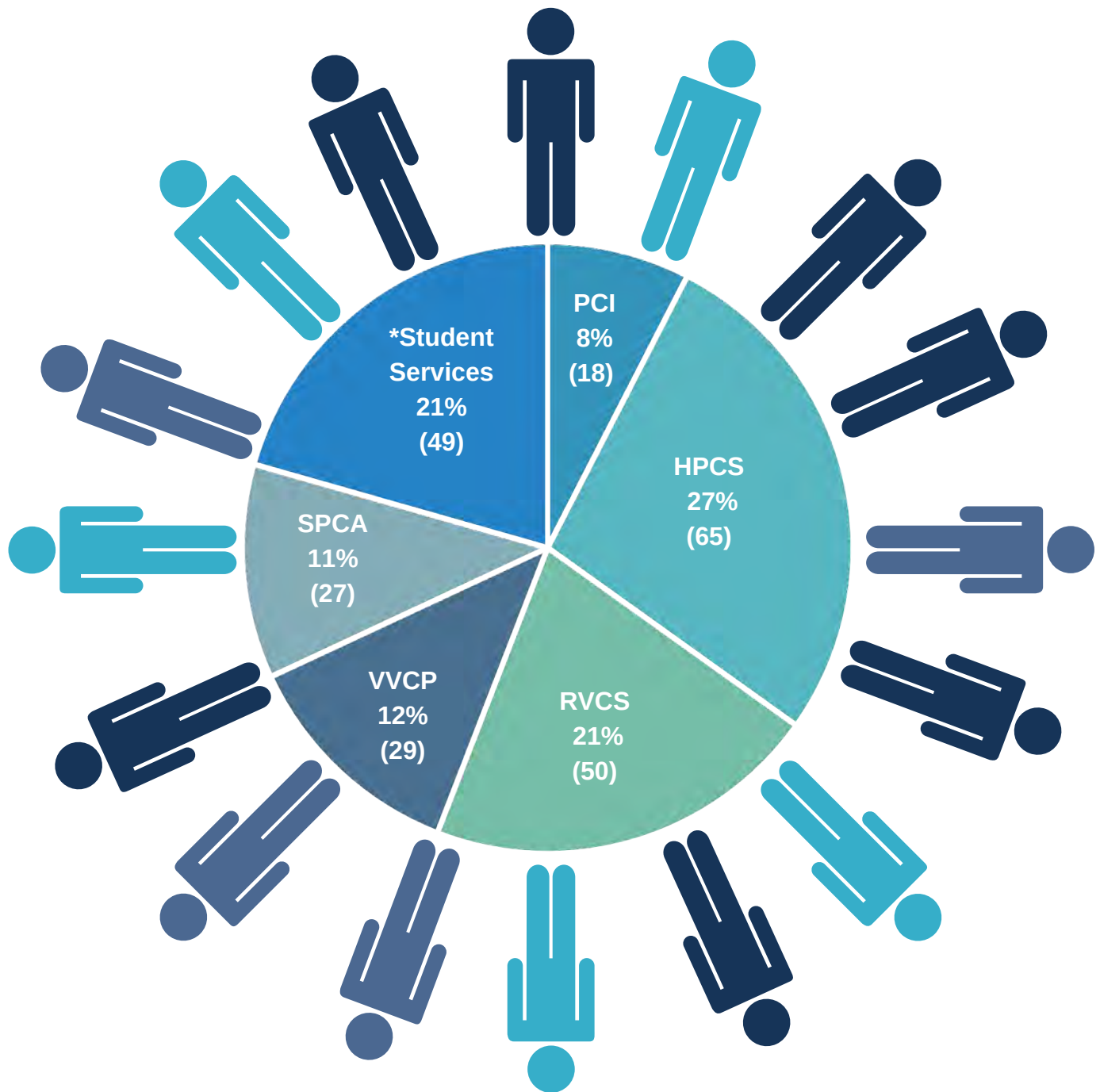

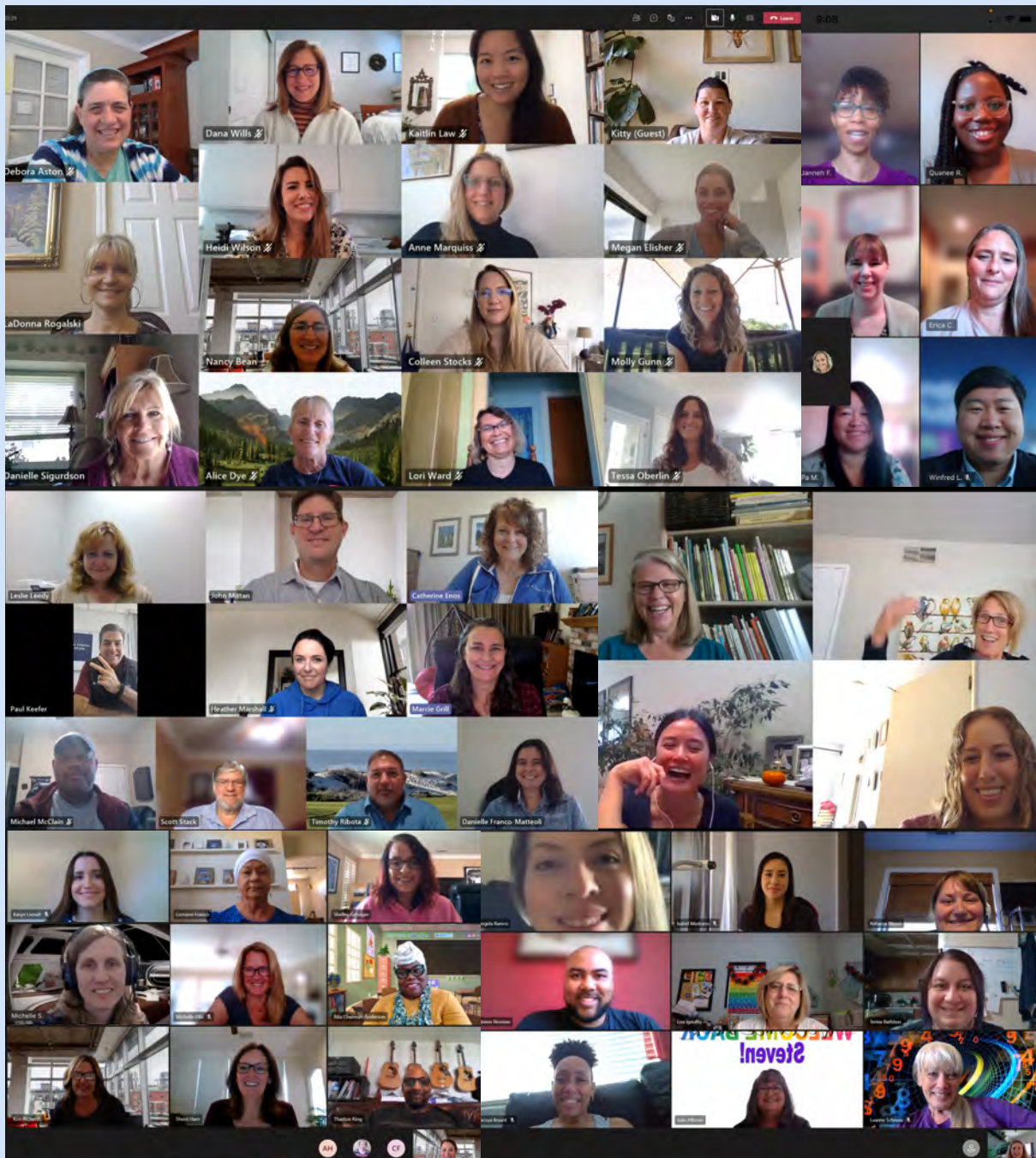

Reaching Out to Our Staff



PCI was aware that the pandemic could equally affect our students as well as our team. A two-pronged approach to support our team included the launch of our Staff Wellness Initiative and increased communications at all levels.

Staff Wellness Initiative

The Staff Wellness Initiative involves components similar to the help PCI offers students including messages of self-care and resources as well as a confidential link to request assistance. Increasing communications called for 100% familiarity with TEAMS for live one-to-one, department, committee, and school-wide virtual meetings to all PCI staff virtual events. Meetings were increased in frequency with time for personal connections. Departments and staff opened routine office hours for reaching out, and daily, live, online tech support was available.

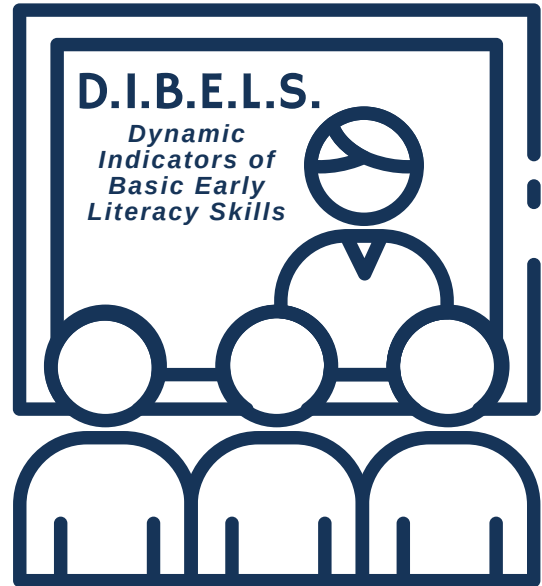

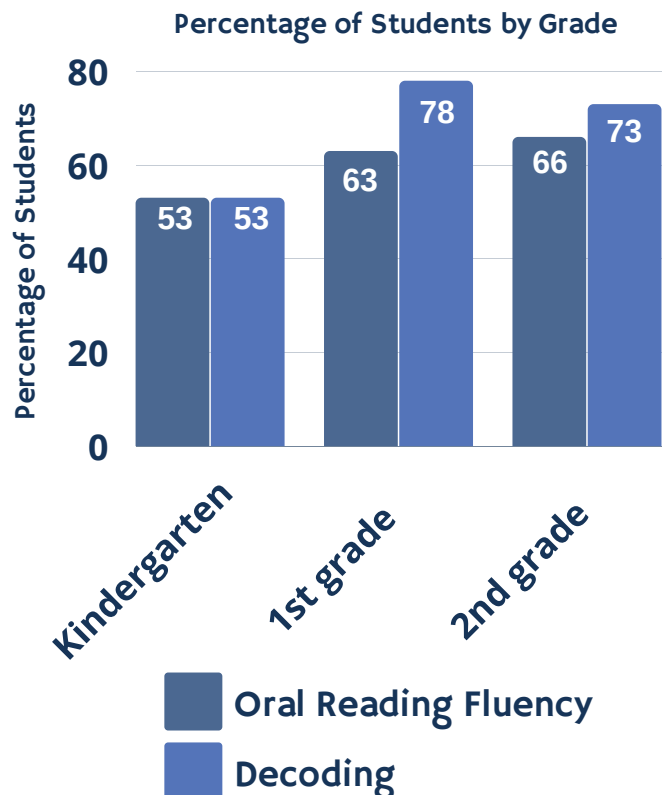

Early Literacy with DIBELS

Knowing the importance of early literacy to a student's academic success, PCI embraced a multi-year goal for growth with an incrementally increasing target for improvement. A toolbox of intervention strategies including Reading Eggs and Lexia CORE 5 were matched to individual student needs. Early Literacy Development Forums for staff collaboration across all four charter schools were established. The goal of 60% of 2nd graders across PCI meeting benchmark criteria on end of year measures of oral fluency using D.I.B.E.L.S. was surpassed by 6%!



D.I.B.E.L.S. Scores End of Year 2020-21



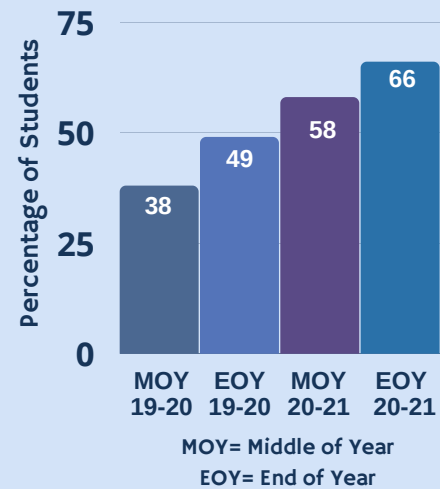

1st Grade 2019-20

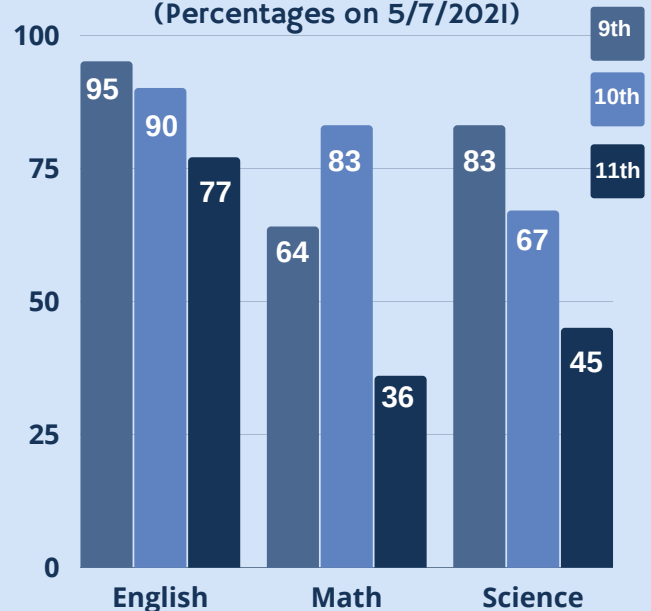
2nd Grade 2020-21

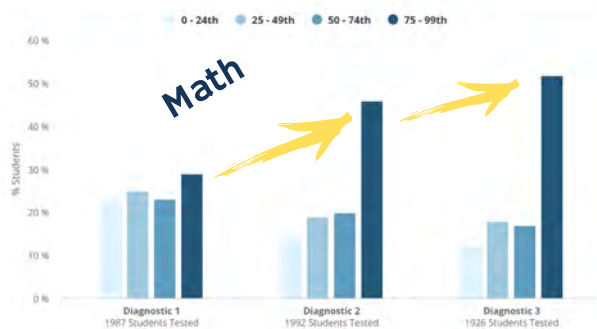
